FROM OUR RECTOR

Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Rabbi Joseph Edelheit was a rabbi in a synagogue of Reform Judaism in Michigan City, Indiana, and an adjunct faculty member of the Department of Theology at Valparaiso University. As a sophomore at the university, I signed up to take his class entitled *Holocaust Theology*. The class dealt with the question, “How can one speak of God in light of the horrors of the Holocaust?” During the first week or two of the course, Rabbi Edelheit methodically addressed Christian stereotypes of Judaism and Jewish people that often led to horrible atrocities committed against Jews throughout Christian history, including the Inquisition and the Holocaust. Many of these stereotypes had their source in the belief that Christianity was the apex of God’s will for the world and that Christianity had superseded Judaism as the “one true faith.” Jesus was God’s Messiah, and all must believe in him to gain salvation. Since the Jews rejected Christ, Judaism must be rejected. In its most radicalized form, many Christians believed Jews were responsible for killing Christ, and that Christians were thus justified in their most radical actions against the Jews. In the course of those two initial weeks, Rabbi Edelheit not only took on these gross stereotypes, but also methodically dismantled the childhood faith in which I was raised, but then spent the rest of the course helping me build a more mature faith, challenging me to think more clearly and take full responsibility for what I believed. I count Rabbi Joseph Edelheit one of my mentors in the faith.

Each month, as we prepare for another installment of our *Family Education Night*, I repeat the same line: “Mentoring our young people in the faith is key to their Christian formation, so we encourage all adults to come and learn alongside the young people and share their faith with them.” It is a plea, really, for all adults in the parish to take responsibility for bringing our children and youth up in the faith. Raising children used to be a communal affair in both home and church. Children would often interface with extended family—grandparents, aunts, uncles, and others—who helped raise the children to adulthood.



It was the same way in the church; adults, teachers, pastors, the Ladies Aid, and others would often have a hand in molding children and youth in the faith. But in our mobile society, it is not so any longer, and people who are not related to the children in the parish feel a bit skittish about taking responsibility. Perhaps it is the result of fear arising out of the child sexual scandals that have rocked the church in the last number of years; perhaps it is the result of an extreme individualism and concern with privacy that has crept into our culture. No matter the source, the church still insists that it is primarily a *community* of faith that nurtures and builds the individual members up. In our baptismal liturgy, the community gathered is asked if they will assume responsibility for the child being baptized and support the parents and godparents in their role of bringing the child up in the faith. Often we so blithely answer in the affirmative as part of our liturgical

routine, but do we really think about what we are promising and take our promises before God seriously?

The promise we make to the child being baptized is none other than the promise to be a mentor in the faith to that child; to assist in the raising of the child in the Christian faith; to nurture that child in God's Word and the Sacraments. Do we? Do we show up on one Sunday evening a month to spend time with our children and youth and learn alongside of them? Do we offer to bring the children to church and formation classes if their parents cannot because of work schedules or other conflicts? Mentoring at its base is nothing more than spending time with someone and taking a genuine interest in them.

This month I invite you to reflect on those in your lives who have been mentors to you. What did they do for you? Why was the time they spent with you significant? What difference did they make in your lives? How did they help you become the person you are today? The current issue of *The Christian Century* (located on the table in the narthex) is devoted to stories of mentors in the faith. I invite you to read these stories at your leisure as you reflect on your mentors. And then I invite you to ask, "How can I be a mentor to the children and youth of this parish."

Opening: Fr. Jeffrey read the story of the birth of Christ from the Gospel of Luke.

Opening: Fr. Jeffrey welcomed everyone and stated the reason for the extra meeting was to finalize the 2014 Proposed Budget for presentation to the congregation at the Annual Meeting.

DaNelle Nisley, Treasurer, answered several questions about the proposed budget.

Line items discussed:

1. Cut Outreach from \$5000 to \$500. This committee has fundraisers to help with their outreach projects.
2. Become paper free, one page bulletins, online newsletters where possible.
3. Cut diocesan assessment
4. Eliminate communication budget
5. Check into bulk mail costs
6. Lawn service/snow removal – done by volunteers?
7. Eliminate outgoing vestry member gifts
8. Do we need pledge envelopes?

CHURCH OF OUR SAVIOR IN HISTORY

Baptismal Font

The baptismal font in the Church was given in memory of Louise Gilman Wilcox. The following is engraved on the base of the baptismal font:

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In Loving Memory Of Louise Gilman Wilcox

Born Nov. 30 1876

Entered Paradise Sept 23, 1899

Louise was the daughter of Platt J. Gilman and Mary E. Kramph Gilman (founders of the Parish). Her siblings were Annie C. Kramph, the Rt. Rev. Alfred A. Gilman, Kate M. Woolsey, Margaret M. Saint, Carl F. Gilman (died on December 18, 1889 at the age of 5 from diphtheria), and Orilla F. Birge.

Louise Gilman and John Quincy Wilcox (known as J.Q. Wilcox) were married on Wednesday, June 14, 1899 by the Rt. Rev. Anson R. Graves. Louise Gilman Wilcox died on Saturday, September 22, 1899 at the age of 23. Her funeral was held at Church of Our Savior on Monday, September 24, 1899. The Reverend Thomas Bates from Sidney conducted the service as Mr. Beecher was out of town on vacation.

J.Q. Wilcox was the owner of Wilcox Department Store in North Platte and was very active in the Parish. (Mr. Wilcox served as a member of the Vestry, as Senior Warden and as Sunday School Superintendent. He was also involved in the organization of Good Samaritan Hospital.) The date of birth engraved on the base of the baptismal font is November 30, 1876. The baptismal record [in the Parish Register] for Mary Louise Gilman indicates she was born on November 30, 1875.

The date of death engraved on the base of the baptismal font is September 23, 1899. The burial record [in the Parish Register] for Louise Gilman Wilcox indicates she died on Saturday, September 22, 1899 and that she was 23 years old at the time of her death. The obituary in the Tuesday, September 26, 1899 issue of the North Platte Semi-Weekly Tribune states: "Mrs. J.Q. Wilcox died at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. P.J. Gilman, shortly after seven o'clock Saturday evening from some affection of the heart. Death came very unexpectedly, the spirit taking its flight while the body reposed in sleep, and without the knowledge of those in the room. Mrs. Wilcox was taken ill about a month ago, but at no time was her condition considered serious, and that the icy hand of death was so soon to be laid upon her was foreign to the thoughts of the family. Her death, coming so unexpectedly, was therefore all the more sorrowful to the family and the husband."

Altar and Reredos

The altar and reredos in St. George's Chapel (which were in the sanctuary of the second church building damaged by fire on July 14, 1962) were built and carved by The Rev. Charles F. Chapman, rector of Church of Our Savior from October of 1905 to September of 1913. The following note was found in the February 23, 1909 issue of the *North Platte Semi-Weekly Tribune*:

"Rev. C.F. Chapman has just completed a walnut altar for the chapel at the Church of Our Saviour that in point of workmanship, both in the finish and the carving, is as fine as one would wish to see. Mr. Chapman is adept in fine woodwork, having made a study of it in his earlier years."

Mr. Chapman's March 27, 1913 entry in the Parish Register (No. 3) reflects: ". . . The rector gathered wood from the various members, old walnut tables and beds, and built and carved the altar in the Church. The reredos was

made of two saloon-bars, one being the first finished saloon bar in North Platte belonging to Guy Lang (sic). The altar was presented to the parish by the rector as an offering of love and affection. The altar itself contains 88 pieces." Parish Register Vol. 3, Page 15

The following is carved on the left side panel of the altar: "This altar built and given to the Church Our Savior by Rev. C.F. Chapman 1909." Mr. Chapman presented the reredos to the parish on April 17, 1912. The reredos was affixed to the east wall of the sanctuary in the second church building. The altar was placed against the reredos. The altar and reredos (after being refinished) were placed in the chapel of the new church building in 1964. The reredos was attached to the east wall of the chapel. The altar was moved forward, rather than being placed against the reredos.

The burn marks on the top of the reredos are from candles. In the early 1930s a second higher gradine (shelf) was added to the altar. Two brass altar candelabras were set on the second gradine. With the addition of the second gradine the tops of the candles were near the top of the reredos. The second gradine was made by The Rev. Francis J. Pryor III. A picture of the altar and reredos taken during the 1940s shows shelves for flower vases on the left and right sides of the reredos. These shelves were removed.

Guy's Place

The reredos in St. George's Chapel was made from two saloon bars. One of the bars came from Guy Laing's saloon, known as "Guy's Place". Nellie Snyder Yost mentions Guy Laing's saloon in two of her books:

"In time Guy Laing's saloon, across the street from the depot, came to be the favorite with Cody and the general run of cowboys." *The call of the range: the story of the Nebraska Stock Growers Association* by Nellie Irene Snyder Yost; Sage Books, 1966, at page 51.

"Saloons were probably more numerous than any other kind of business in North Platte. There were at least seven on the three main streets of the town and both the drug stores and the general stores also sold liquor and wine. If half the stories told of Buffalo Bill and his drinking are true, he must have patronized all of them, although only a few are mentioned with any frequency by those who knew him. One belonged to Guy Laing, his rancher friend; it was a highly popular Front Street place, directly across from the depot." *Buffalo Bill: His Family, Friends, Fame, Failures, and Fortunes* by Nellie Irene Snyder Yost; Swallow Press, 1979, at page 209.

Guy's Place is mentioned in the biographical sketch of Guy Alvah Laing:

"167. GUY ALVAH LAING . . . In 1880 Guy opened a popular resort in North Platte, known as "Guy's Place," in which he was a highly successful caterer. He was an enthusiastic wheelman and acted as captain of the North Platte club for some time . . ." *A Genealogical Record of the Descendants of Peter Johnston* edited by Charles Ernest Johnston, Mitchell, Print., 1900, at page 86.

One of Buffalo Bill's visits to Guy Laing's saloon is described in *Buffalo Bill's America* by Louis S. Warren; Random House 2007, at page 505. This book can be viewed on the Google Books website. <http://books.google.com/> Annie Oakley also visited Guy Laing's saloon. See: *Annie Oakley* by Shirl Kasper; University of Oklahoma Press 2000, at page 50. There is the phrase "If these walls could talk". With respect to the reredos in St. George's Chapel it can be said: "If this reredos could talk".
